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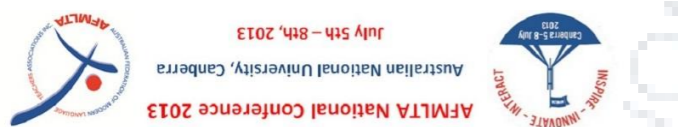

Keynote Speaker Information

Dr Lid King

Dr Lid King has extensive experience of languages teaching, materials development and examining at secondary level, and in Adult and Higher Education. As Director of CILT (1992-2003) he played a major part in expanding the work of the organisation, spearheading a range of national and European projects, including the establishment of the Comenius network of regional language networks and the initiation of support for Primary Languages. He was centrally involved in the development of support services on languages to British business, and the establishment of a Languages National Training Organisation in 1997.

Between September 2003 and April 2011 he was National Director for Languages with responsibility for the effective implementation of the English National Languages Strategy, and its centrepiece of an entitlement to language learning for all pupils in Primary Schools. Between 2006 and 2007 Lid worked with Lord Dearing on the Languages Review of which he is co-author. He has extensive experience of languages both in the UK and Europe and has worked for the Council of Europe and led major European Projects. Since 2011 he has continued to work in support of a strategic approach to languages in England and Europe through The Languages Company which he established in 2008.

Tim Lindsey is Malcolm Smith Professor of Asian Law and Director of the Centre for Indonesian Law, Islam and Society at the Melbourne Law School. He holds a Bachelor of Laws, Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Letters from The University of Melbourne and completed his PhD thesis in Indonesian studies. He teaches and researches Indonesian law, Shari'a (Islamic law), comparative law and law reform in developing countries. He is the Chair of the Australia Indonesia Institute and practises at the Victorian Bar. His publications include *Indonesia: Law and Society*; *Law Reform in Developing Countries*; *The Indonesian Constitution*; and *Corruption in Asia*. He is a founding editor of *The Australian Journal of Asian Law*.

Matthew Absalom is a university teacher and researcher, professional linguist, Italian language coach, translator and published author. He holds qualifications in music, education, languages and linguistics, and his research interests cover Italian linguistics, computer assisted language learning, and languages education. Lesley Harbon is the 2013 Keith Horwood Memorial Lecture at the 19th Biennial AFMLTA Conference at the Australian National University, Canberra. Lesley is a Language Teacher Educator in the Faculty of Education and Social Work at The University of Sydney. She taught Indonesian and German at primary, secondary and tertiary levels in four Australian states between 1982 and 1995 before moving into language teacher education at Charles Sturt University (1995), University of Tasmania (1996 – 2002), and The University of Sydney (2002 – 2013). Lesley edited *Pelangi* magazine, a classroom resource for Indonesian language teachers, published by University of Southern Queensland Press between 1985 and 1999. Lesley edited and co-edited the AFMLTA journal, *Babel*, between 2000 and 2006. She was President of the AFMLTA between 2008 and 2010. Her research focuses on language teacher professional learning, bilingual education, intercultural language education, and the value of short term international experiences on language teacher professionalism. Alongside Michelle Kohler and Anne-Marie Morgan, Lesley is co-author of the Cengage Indonesian textbook series, *Dari Kami Ke Kita*, published in 2010/2011. She recently co-edited *Language Teachers' Narratives of Practice* with Robyn Moloney, published in early 2013 by Cambridge Scholars Publishing.
